Ernstbrunn History

Castle Ernstbrunn, a stunning castle located in the charming town of Ernstbrunn in Austria's north, is steeped in rich history and holds immense cultural significance. Its impressive architecture has been shaped over the centuries, blending various styles including Gothic, Renaissance, and Baroque.

Castle Ernstbrunn was first mentioned in a document from the 11th century and was extensively renovated by the Sinzendorf family in the 17th century. In 1775, it underwent another renovation and expansion. Since the 19th century the Reuss family has since restored and renovated the castle and has made it available for rent as a venue for weddings, events, and film productions. While the castle is not open to the public for regular tours, it is occasionally used for cultural events and exhibitions. Since the 17th century a 40 ha garden was designed as an ornamental and and landscaped area, parts of which were turned into a Wildpark. Since 2009, the Wolf Science Center has been located in the Wildpark Ernstbrunn which offers guided tours that explain and demonstrate the behavioral research on timber wolves. Heinrich Reuss has kindly offered to host our Next Generation Conference on Saturday allowing us to get a deeper understanding of their innovative operations outside of the noise of the city.

Kreuzenstein History

Kreuzenstein Castle is a remarkable gothic revival fortress of the 19th century situated north of Vienna. Built on the ruins of a medieval castle from the 12th century it is one of the most important buildings of this style in Austria.

The previous fortress Kreuzenstein has played an important role in Austria's rich history. It was the seat of the noble families who ruled over the surrounding area, and it served as a significant center of power and influence in the region. In the 16th century, the castle was abandoned.

The Austrian adventurer, collector and benefactor Johann Nepomuk Wilczek rebuilt it at the end of the 19th century. Count Wilczek used for the reconstruction original material of the previous epochs and own ideas of a historic medieval fortress.

Kreuzenstein is still owned by the Wilczek family, who continue to preserve and maintain the castle for future generations. It houses parts of the great collections of Johann Nepomuk of gothic and renaissance art and interior.

Kreuzenstein Castle is also famous as a film location. Several notable movies where shooted in the castle's picturesque setting, including the 1993 movie The Three Musketeers. Additionally, the castle is home to several cultural events, including concerts, exhibitions, and historical reenactments.



Palais Pallavicini

History

Pallavicini Palace is a stunning aristocratic residence with a rich history located in the heart of Vienna. The location close to the imperial Hofburg palace points out the important role of its previous owners in the Austrian and the Holy Roman Empire.

The present palace is a building of the 18th century presenting the first neoclassic facade of its time in Vienna. The architect Ferdinand Hetzendorf von Hohenberg also worked for the imperial family and designed parts of the imperial castle ensemble in Schönbrunn, and the gothic-revival restorations of some Viennese churches.

The interior of the palace is a unique blend of grandeur and elegance of the 19th century preserved to this day.

The palace has played an important role in Vienna's social and political history, hosting grand balls, concerts, and other cultural and politic events and welcoming many notable guests, including statesmen, artists, and musicians.

The palace is property of the present owner family Markgraf Pallavicini since 1842 and is used nowadays for weddings, balls and other cultural events.

In the former stables it hosts Elmayer –Vienna's oldest and most famous dancing school since 1919. The palace became world famous as film location for the 1949 film The Third Man, starring Orson Welles and Joseph Cotton.

Am Hof 8 History

The narrow red house, also known as "the narrow house" due to its narrow building plot in the vernacular, is a Renaissance burgher house that has a long and fascinating history. Dating back to 1528, it was built by Wilhelm von Pellenstrass, an imperial herald, and was originally part of the possessions of the court hospital. Its predecessor house was mentioned in a document in 1445, adding to its historical significance.

As one of the oldest houses in Vienna, the narrow red house boasts unique architectural features, including a facade that slopes backwards on the side of the Tiefen Graben. Additionally, it has a three-storey cellar that dates back to the construction period, making it a rare find in Vienna. Inside the house is the only preserved tower staircase in the city.

Over the years, the house has undergone several changes, including the addition of a fourth floor in the 18th century. In recent times, the house has taken on a new role, as owner Johannes Kattus has transformed it into Viennas first private members club. Since its opening in 2022, the club has quickly become a sought-after location, a great representation of the next generation spirit.

On sunday the brunch will be hosted in the exclusive spaces in the heart of Vienna by Am Hof 8.




